# October Dean's Message



This month, I would like to share some ideas on how we can make it easier on ourselves when playing the organ. Let's call it my top ten suggestions for smoother and more relaxed organ playing.

- 10. Keep all extra motion to a minimum. Remember the eyewitness reports of how easy J. S. Bach made it look to play the organ.
- 9. Use less arm weight no need to press so hard into the keys.
- 8. If your leg needs to move toward the end of the pedal board, rock your weight to the opposite hip so that the leg that needs to move can move more easily.
- 7. Keep your wrists relaxed and flexible.
- 6. Have a feeling of "wiping" the keys rather than striking them.
- 5. As much as possible, release the notes by moving the fingers backwards into the hand rather than upwards, unless the next note is a black key.
- 4. Keep your neck as relaxed as possible. This is especially difficult when needing to look up through the bottom portion of eyeglasses in order to read the notes.
- 3. Beware of clenching your jaw when things get stressful.
- 2. Keep your shoulders as relaxed as possible. This is difficult when reaching for upper manuals. Leaning forward from the hips can help.
- 1. Sit on the bench with the feeling of being lifted rather than slouching. Your lungs will be grateful and you will breathe better.

Bad habits die hard, but hopefully some of these suggestions can help us be more successful at the very physical task of playing the organ.



# Margaret Smith McAlister

#### 1923-2017

Margaret Smith McAlister, a Tampa native and lifelong resident, passed away peacefully on September 11, 2017. Margaret was a well known organist and musician in the area having served as organist at a variety of churches during her high school and college years. In 1947, Margaret became organist at First Presbyterian Church in Tampa, where she served faithfully until her retirement in 2012. Margaret was a member of the American Guild of Organists since 1940. She served



two terms as Dean of the Tampa Chapter, and several terms as A.G.O District Convener for the state of Florida. Each year, the Tampa Chapter of the A.G.O. bestows a scholarship in Margaret's name to a local organ student. She was a friend of the Clearwater Chapter and was an honorary member of the Chapter. A service of celebration of Margaret's life was held Saturday, September 23 at First Presbyterian Church, Tampa. #### Positions Available

Prince of Peace Lutheran Church (ELCA) Largo, is seeking a full-time Parish Musician to lead the entire music ministry of the congregation. Duties include supporting the congregation's song instrumentally for two services each Sunday, direct choirs at each service, and have responsibility for children's music and development. The ministry includes a 58-rank Austin pipe organ, Steinway grand piano, harpsichord, three octaves of handbells, chimes, and percussion instruments. The candidate should be familiar with Lutheran order of worship. Applicants should submit a resume and a recording that includes a prelude and the hymn "A Mighty Fortress" played on the organ, and a hymn of the candidate's choice played on the piano. St. Andrews Presbyterian Church, Dunedin, is seeking an organist. This position is part time (approximately 10-15 hours weekly). Hours include: weekly rehearsals and Sunday mornings, along with preparation.

The ideal candidate should have and demonstrate strong experience or training on a pipe organ. An Associate degree in Music Leadership or related field supplemented by two (2) years' experience as an Organist or equivalent work experience is preferred.

#### Celtic Tour

Tom and Cindy Huffman were among 42 people from across the USA who gathered on September 2 in Edinburgh, Scotland for the start of a 10-day musical excursion with composer Joseph Martin who conducted the choir.



We sang and played in significant cathedrals as we as enjoyed the sights of Scotland, Northern Ireland and The Republic of Ireland.

The concerts consisted of choral anthems and organ solos by Tom Huffman in St. Giles' Cathedral, Edinburgh; St. Columb's Cathedral, Derry/Londonderry; and St. Patrick's Cathedral, Dublin. In Dublin, the organ was not accessible to us so we only did the choral portion in concert, however the staff at

both Derry and Edinburgh cathedrals was very welcoming and allowed me all afternoon on the organs—57 stop 3M tracker 1992 Rieger (about 80 ranks) at St. Giles; and a 1992 4M electro-pneumatic Wells-Kennedy organ at St. Columb's. As expected, without AGO standards the consoles took a bit of getting used to with the divisional drawknobs in different positions and couplers grouped in with the stopknobs. The pedalboards were flatter and interestingly most Scottish/Irish organs generally only have 30 pedal notes (the top F# and G are missing). The St. Giles organist, Peter Backhouse, had just completed an American tour and he shared that it took him a bit to get used to having the "extra" notes. The photos are both at St. Giles, Edinburgh.
