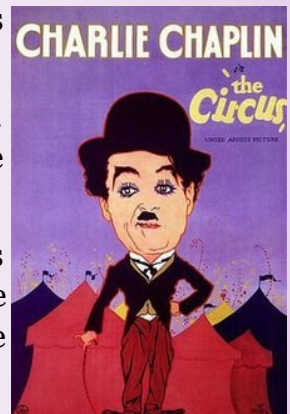

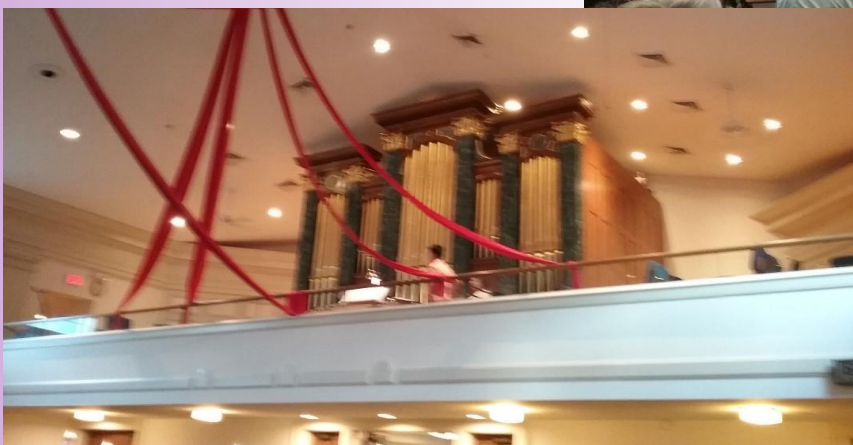
and fellowship with colleagues. The instruments we heard were diverse—from an 1876/2001 William and Johnson & Son organ at Trinity Anglican Church to the Allen “organ” at First Presbyterian Church. The program by Charles Tompkins and his son Gregory (on violin) at St. Paul’s Angli-



can Church in Conway SC was the highlight of the convention for me (Casavant). Instruments by Zimmer and Schantz with additions by Ontko & Young were played by various gifted artists. Again, my thanks for helping

When my wife Michelle and I began planning our summer travels shortly after Easter this year, it didn't take much convincing to settle on the AGO regional convention in Buffalo, NY. Upon our arrival in 80° Buffalo at noon on July 1, I knew we had made a good decision.

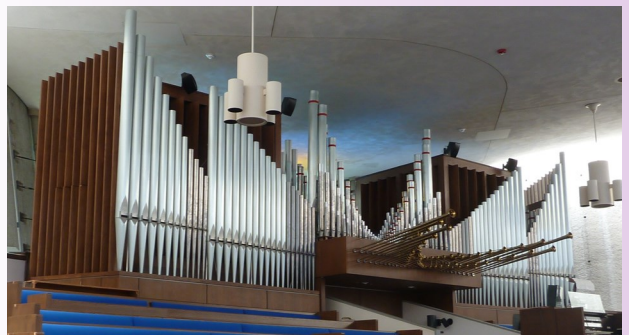
That evening's program featured Nathan Laube at St. Joseph Cathedral. Nathan's recital was nothing short of stunning. I was left speechless after hearing the 1877 90-stop Hook and Hastings organ. Installed as a showpiece for the 1876



Centennial celebration in Philadelphia, the organ was acclaimed as the "dictionary of American organs." Nathan's program highlighted the eclectic orchestral sound of this era. He played music of Franck and Whitlock, who composed for that very concept. His interpretation of Olivier Latry's *Salve Regina* (originally improvised at the University of Kansas) took me right to the nave of Notre-Dame de Paris. Nathan saved the best for last with his transcription of Wagner's *Tannhäuser Overture*. It was a natural pairing, repertoire and instrument, as *Tannhäuser* premiered but 15 years before this organ was built.

On Tuesday, we attended in a Festival of Psalms at Temple Beth Zion, one of the largest Reform synagogues in the nation. This featured Cantor Penny Myer and Ball State University organist (and Buffalo native) Stephen Price. The organ (a midsize Casavant from the early 80s) wasn't anything special, but the room was replete with powerful symbolism. The ten scalloped walls symbolizing the ten commandments, each side bowing outward representing outstretched arms.

The ominous, brutalist concrete building serves as an affront to the fire which destroyed the original temple in 1961. Hundreds of exposed formwork holes in the concrete symbolize the unfinished work of God.



Wednesday featured a choral recital through the liturgical year featuring the music of Roland Martin. Martin is organ professor at the University of Buffalo, and publishes choral music through St. James Music Press (sjmp.com—a valued resource for me at Prince of Peace!). I also attended a workshop on new music facilitated by Carson Cooman, and a refreshing workshop on hymn playing and free improvisation led by Bruce Neswick. Katelyn Emerson's varied program on the Fisk organ at the U. of Buffalo was a breath of fresh air. So many convention recitals lean heavily on commissions and obscure composers, while Katelyn flawlessly performed music of Bach, Mozart, Franck, Vierne, and Messiaen.

Michelle and I took some time to ourselves on Thursday, July 4. Enjoying the overcast day at the riverfront and meeting up with some good friends close by. We made it back in time for Bruce Neswick's hymn festival, where we experienced in real-time many of the techniques he had just taught in his workshop. The closing recital was performed from memory by David Higgs at Westminster Presbyterian (IV/80 Aeolian-Skinner) and opened with the Reger variations on *God Save the King* (My Country 'Tis of Thee)...a perfect ending to the Fourth.



I am truly thankful to the Clearwater AGO for affording me this opportunity. I would not have been able to attend this wonderful week if it weren't for our supportive chapter board. We finished the week exhausted, but refreshed. We then spent the next ten days driving out to Portland, Maine and down to Boston...visiting over forty craft breweries. But that's another story!

Cathedral of St. John the Divine

Most all are aware of the tragic fire at the Notre Dame Cathedral, Paris, however this note from organist Frederick Hohmann tells us of another fire the day before the Paris blaze:

"Many have been unaware that the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City suffered a fire on the morning of April 14, 2019, Palm Sunday. Several weeks ago, I was informed by Douglass Hunt, curator of the Great Organ at the Cathedral, that the Palm Sunday fire was located in a portion of the Cathedral crypt in an area not normally open to the public. While (this) fire was small in scope when compared with the much more devastating fire that occurred in December of 2001, the April 2019 fire was still serious, and it brought forth some damage..

While the cathedral remains open for worship services, visitors and tourists, the thin layer of soot and debris that made its way into the air in the Cathedral Great Choir and Nave area led to a decision to shut down the Great Organ, pending a more thorough assessment of the damage by the Cathedral's organ curator and its insurer, and pending a proper cleaning and restoration of the Great Organ.....a digital organ from Walker Technical Company has been installed and...is in service at this time."

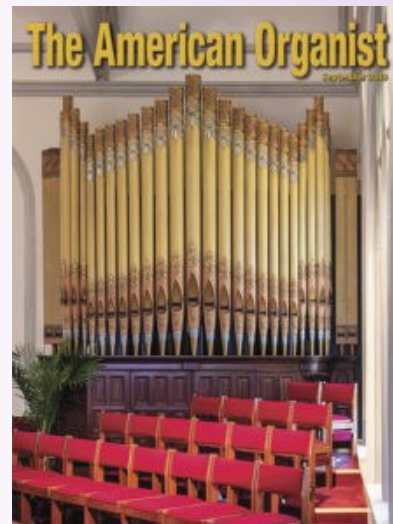
